To the Citizens of Flagler County,

As your Sheriff, I believe an informed community is an engaged and a safer community. In order to keep you informed, I am pleased to provide you our 2019 Annual Report for the Flagler County Sheriff's Office.

As you review this Annual Report, you will see that we have implemented many new initiatives and expanded existing initiatives during 2019 to reduce crime in our community. These new initiatives, along with the dedication of our professional team, resulted in a 17% reduction in crime during 2019. Traffic fatalities were down 44% in 2019 and are down 67% since 2017. Overall, in the last three years, crime is down in Flagler County by 36%.

As the largest and only full-service law enforcement agency in Flagler County, our team is committed to providing you with premier professional law enforcement and court and detention services. We are proud to be a four-diamond accredited agency. With more than 300 professionals serving you, the Sheriff's Office is accredited by the Florida Commission on Law Enforcement Accreditation, the Florida Corrections Accreditation Commission, the National Institute of Ethics, and our emergency communications center is accredited by the Florida Tele-Communicators Accreditation Commission. In 2019, FCSO was honored to be selected as "One of the Top 10 Best Places to Work in Volusia-Flagler" counties and the only government agency to receive this recognition.

It has been our honor to serve you in 2019 and we look forward to continue serving you in 2020 as we implement new initiatives, such as a Cyber Crimes Unit, Cold Case Unit and unveil our Real-Time Crime Center.

Text-to-911 is Available for All Residents in Flagler County - 2/14/19

The Flagler County Board of County Commissioners and the FCSO announced in February that Text-to-911 was available to all residents in Flagler County.

Text-to-911 allows residents to send text messages to local 911 call centers during an emergency. Texting in an emergency may be beneficial for people who have trouble hearing or speaking, or if a voice call is not a viable option. Users must have a cell phone data plan that allows texting.

Flagler County Sheriff's Office Communications Center Receives Re-Accreditation - 2/21/19

The FCSO Emergency Communications Center received its first re-accreditation as an accredited 911 center by the Florida Telecommunications Commission (FLA-TAC) in February. The FCSO's Communications Center is one of just eight State-Accredited Public Safety Answering Points (PSAPs) in the State of Florida.



FCSO SWAT Team Competes in 2019 UAE SWAT Challenge in Dubai - 2/15/19

On February 6th, eight members of the FCSO SWAT Team flew to Dubai to participate in the 2019 UAE SWAT Challenge. FCSO was one of four agencies from the United States invited by the United Arab Emirates (UAE) Ministry of Interior and Dubai Police to participate in the training competition. All travel and accommodations for FCSO's team were paid for by the Dubai Police and UAE.

FCSO placed 34/49 in the SWAT Tactical Event, 23/49 in the SWAT Assault Event, 38/49 in the SWAT Officer Rescue event, 16/49 in the SWAT Tower Event, and 45/49 in the SWAT Obstacle Course. Collectively, FCSO placed 32nd overall.

FCSO Inmates Continue to S.T.R.I.D.E. Towards Success - 3/1/19

Sheriff Rick Staly recognized inmates Josiah Merriwether and Elisha Payne-Clark for their progress in the S.T.R.I.D.E. 'Road to Success' program and the S.T.R.I.D.E. G.E.D. course. While incarcerated, Merriweather received his G.E.D. and Payne-Clark was able to increase his Reading and Comprehension two grade-levels.

S.T.R.I.D.E. includes a multitude of programs for inmates being held for trial or sentenced to the county jail including G.E.D. courses, Alcoholics Anonymous meetings, Narcotics Anonymous meetings, and Christian-based Anger Management classes for inmates to attend, among others.

Additionally, non-denominational ministry services are offered at least weekly for inmates. A faith-based recovery program is offered by Open Door Ministries in the jail to both men and women and after release to help rehabilitate offenders. The county jail also works with the Family Life Center to offer domestic violence counseling each month to female inmates.

In April, Sheriff Rick Staly held a public meeting on "Addressing Crime Together" at the Hilton Garden Inn in Palm Coast. During this annual meeting open to all members of the community, Sheriff Staly discusses crime trends in Flagler County, the initiatives the Sheriff's Office has made to improve public safety, and reveals new Sheriff's Office plans for the following year.

"We have a terrific, motivated team serving the community and I attribute the reduction in crime and the increase in arrests to their proactive police work, engaging and partnering with the community, and the new initiatives that we have implemented since I became Sheriff," Sheriff Staly said at the time.





FCSO Unveils New Bloodhound Pup - 4/26/19

In April, the FCSO announced that for the first time in decades the K-9 Unit would now have a bloodhound! Dr. Caesar DePaço, who is also the Honorary Consul of Portugal, personally donated the monies needed to purchase the bloodhound for FCSO.

"We cannot thank Dr. DePaço enough. This little guy will be a phenomenal addition to our team," Sheriff Rick Staly said. And he has been!



Sheriff Presents FCSO Volunteers with Presidents Volunteer Awards - 4/17/19

As part of National Volunteer Service Week, the FCSO held a ceremony inside the Kim C. Hammond Justice Center to honor thirty-two volunteers from six volunteer units within the Sheriff's Office for their service.

"It is an honor to award these volunteers with

the President's Volunteer Service Award," Sheriff Rick Staly said. "The Flagler County Sheriff's Office simply could not be as effective in serving our community and keeping our residents safe without the tremendous amount of support we receive from our volunteers."

FCSO Unveils Newly Wrapped School Resource Deputy Vehicles Designed by Students - 4/26/19

At the start of the 2018-19 school year, Sheriff Rick Staly and the FCSO School Resource Deputies (SRD) started a project with Flagler Schools and Imagine School Town Center students to design car wraps for the SRDs' vehicles.



The students were encouraged to submit designs to the SRD at their school. The designs were then voted on and the winning designs became the wraps for the SRD vehicles.

"I thought it was important for the students to help design their school's SRD car markings," said Sheriff Staly. "I hope that these cars will make each campus proud for years to come and help us build relationships with students knowing they designed the deputy's car while increasing school pride."

Sheriff Renames District 1 Office and Marine Unit in Honor of Captain Grady Prather Jr. - 5/20/19

On May 20th, the FCSO hosted a ribbon cutting ceremony at the FCSO District 1 Office at 69 Mala Compra Road in the Hammock dedicating the newly renovated office in honor of Captain Grady Prather Jr.

In 2018, Sheriff Rick Staly announced that the FCSO would be re-launching a full-time Marine Unit in Captain Grady Prather Jr.'s honor, complete with land and water vehicles to patrol Flagler County's 85-miles of water and 18-miles of ocean shoreline.

"We launched our full-time Marine unit one year ago and we are so happy to finally be unveiling this new signage in honor of Captain Prather," Sheriff Rick Staly said at the time. "Captain Prather was responsible for launching the full-time Marine Unit in modern history and it was discontinued as a full-time unit after he retired, so it is fitting that his name be on the walls of the District 1 Office." Grady's son, FCSO's Deputy Jason Prather, assisted.

Also during the event, FCSO unveiled their refurbished C.O.P. Marine Patrol boat and Pontoon Boat for the FCSO Dive Team.

"Our C.O.P.s wish to help aid in our efforts to keep our waterways safe," Sheriff Rick Staly said. "We





refurbished a pontoon boat for the Dive Team that will serve as a much more appropriate vessel for them when they are called into action. I am very happy to say we now truly have a fully functional and fully operational Marine Unit."

Sheriff Selects New Medical Contractor for Jail - 5/10/19

In May, the FCSO selected Southern Correctional Medicine (SCM) to take over medical care for inmates at the jail. During the selection process, the FCSO interviewed many of the

current clients of SCM and they all gave the company outstanding reviews. Using SCM, the jail now has two nurses on-duty Monday through Friday and one nurse on duty during nights and weekends. The jail also has a mid-level care provider and a Medical Doctor available for more on-site medical hours during each week than with the previous provider.

"We received bids from 5 different medical contractors. We researched each of them and Southern Correctional Medicine rose to the top and was the best choice for our inmates and staff," Sheriff Rick Staly said.

New Four-Legged Addition to FCSO's Youth Services Section and School Resource Deputy Unit - 6/18/19

In June, K-9 Jax was reassigned to Deputy Jason Williams, one of two School Resource Deputies at Flagler Palm Coast High School. K-9 Jax was previously assigned to Commander Jon Welker in the FCSO K-9 Unit. Cmdr. Welker had recently been promoted to Watch Commander which allowed K-9 Jax to be reassigned to a unit where he would be best suited.

K-9 Jax is a single-purpose K-9 that is not aggressive and is provided to the school district at no additional cost. K-9 Jax reports to FPC with Deputy Williams daily. K-9 Jax is also available for any calls for service that may involve explosives or bomb threats at other county schools and in the community. This also marks the first time in agency history that an African-American Deputy is part of the FCSO K-9 unit.

FCSO Donates Patrol Vehicle to Matanzas High School Law and Justice Flagship Program - 7/16/19

In July, FCSO donated a patrol car to the Matanzas High School Law and Justice Flagship program. The patrol car donated is a 2012 Chevy Caprice. It had been used to answer countless calls for service in Flagler County until its planned semi-retirement as an active patrol car. It is valued at \$7,200.00 with the equipment. The vehicle is a fully equipped police vehicle complete with lights and sirens, but no radio.

Before its donation, Sheriff Rick Staly had the car re-marked to complement the MHS Law and Justice program. The vehicle will be used for instruction and scenario-based training, such as traffic stops and traffic control, for the students enrolled in the program.



FCSO Employees Donate Over \$16,000 to the Florida Sheriffs Youth Ranches - 7/31/19

In July, Sheriff Rick Staly presented the Florida Sheriffs Youth Ranches (FSYR) a check for \$16,263.53. The money was raised through payroll deductions from FCSO employees.

"The men and women of the Flagler County Sheriff's Office selflessly donate to support the Florida Sheriffs Youth Ranches each year," Sheriff Staly said. "This money will be used to continue the great work being done by the Florida Sheriff's Youth Ranches for our youth throughout Florida."

Largest Undercover Drug Operation in FCSO History Nets 40 Drug Dealers- 8/20/19

The FCSO Special Investigations Unit obtained felony arrest warrants for 40 different subjects for various narcotics-related charges. This is the largest drug sweep in FCSO history. The arrest warrants are the result of numerous undercover investigations and search warrants into narcotics distributors within Flagler County.

A variety of controlled substances were seized, including over 28 grams of Fentanyl and Heroin, over 124 grams



Cocaine, over 98 grams of Synthetic Cathinones, over 8 grams of Methamphetamine, 3.6 pounds of Cannabis and THC Oil, and over 68 grams of other Controlled Substances. Three firearms were also seized during the operation. The total street value for all narcotics seized amounts to approximately \$40,848.00.

"This was the largest drug sweep Flagler County has ever seen and our detectives did a phenomenal job following up on all leads and getting these poison peddlers off the streets," Sheriff Rick Staly said. "Detectives seized enough Fentanyl and Heroin to kill over 14,000 people. Many tips were sent in by community members who followed the 'see something, say something' initiative and notified us when they saw suspicious activity or knew of drug dealers in our county. We are dedicated to working together to get this poison out of our community."

SEPTEMBER 2019

FCSO Awarded \$3,000 to Continue DV Community Initiative - 9/23/19

In September, the FCSO was awarded equipment totaling over \$3,000.00 from the Florida Coalition Against Domestic Violence (FCADV) to assist in FCSO's community initiative against domestic violence.

"The only way to tackle a problem like domestic violence is to

work together with community partners and organizations like the Florida Coalition against Domestic Violence. We are very thankful for their continued support," Sheriff Rick Staly said. "This new equipment, in addition to our domestic violence detective, analyst, and community partners, will continue our initiative against domestic violence in Flagler County. It's too early to declare victory but we are seeing very positive results from the initiatives working to educate and monitor offenders and to focus on victims along with our community partners who are engaged to stop domestic violence."

FCSO Awarded nearly \$720,000 in 2019 to Enhance Public Safety - 10/2/19


In 2019 the FCSO was awarded grants totaling over \$720,000!

The total was made up of various grants including the Victims of Crime Act Grant, the Weyerhaeuser Corporation, the Department of Justice, the Spirit of the Blue Foundation, and the Edward Byrne Justice

Assistance Grant (JAG) Program.

These funds were used to fund new positions within the organization, buy much needed crime prevention tools and equipment, and to support the FCSO Real Time Crime Center (RTCC), a centralized technology center giving patrol deputies and detectives instant information to identify patterns and stop emerging crime.

"Anytime we can get state, federal, and local grant monies to reduce the burden on taxpayers and further our public safety initiative, we are going after them and trying to bring money back to Flagler County," Sheriff Rick Staly said.

FCSO Implements State of the Art Body-Scanning Technology at the Sheriff Perry Hall Inmate Detention Facility - 10/08/19

In October, the FCSO installed a state of the art full-body contraband detection system called the Intercept Scanner. The Sheriff Perry Hall Inmate Detention Facility is the first detention facility in the State of Florida to have the new Intercept Scanner technology.

The scanner is much less intrusive than the comparable strip search procedure used by most jails today. A strip search typically takes 15 minutes, compared to a body scan which takes only 4 seconds.



"The importance of thorough searches of inmates cannot be stressed enough," Sheriff Staly said. "In an environment like a jail, detention deputies rely on search procedures to ensure the safety of our inmates and staff. This is an exciting upgrade to our technology at the jail. Better security means better safety for all."

SAR Presents Sheriff with Law Enforcement Commendation Medal - 10/16/19

In October, Flagler County Chapter of the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution (SAR) presented Sheriff Rick Staly with the Law Enforcement Commendation Medal for being an outstanding Law Enforcement Officer who has served with distinction and devotion in the field of Law Enforcement.

"The medal recognizes Exceptional Service and Accomplishments in our community," Compatriot David Kelsey said. "We, as descendants of our great nations' very first public servants, take great pride in recognizing you with this medal."

Sheriff Staly was nominated for his exemplary law enforcement service for the past 45 years.



The Law Enforcement Commendation Medal is presented to those who have served with distinction and devotion in the field of law enforcement. The medal is intended to recognize exceptional service or accomplishment in the field of law enforcement.

FCSO Partners with Commissioner of Agriculture to Warn Residents of Gas Pump Skimmers this Holiday Season - 11/14/19

In November, the FCSO collaborated with the Florida Commissioner of Agriculture to warn residents of potential scams they could be facing at the gas pumps during the holiday season.

In a short public service announcement, Flagler County Sheriff Rick Staly and Florida Agriculture Commissioner Nikki Fried alert the public to this



gas pump scam and are offering residents tips on how it can be avoided.

"I am very thankful to Commissioner Fried for her partnership in getting this message out to our residents in Flagler County and across the state," Sheriff Rick Staly said. "The holidays can be a hectic time and that is exactly what these thieves are counting on. The success of their scam depends on you being in a rush and not paying attention. Don't be an easy target! Taking a few extra seconds to be safe at the pump can save you a lot of money and a lot of hassle."

Three New FCSO K-9s Complete Training, Ready for Activation - 11/21/19

In November, the FCSO announced that K-9s Odin and Axle, along with their handlers Cpl. Tarczewski and Deputy Beausoleil, completed a 480-hour Florida Department of Law Enforcement (FDLE) K-9 Team training course and a 200-hour narcotics detection course on November 19, 2019. The two K-9 teams are now active on patrol in Flagler County.

Also finished with training and ready for active patrol are K-9 Holmes and Cpl. Gimbel, FCSO's first bloodhound team in decades. The team completed over 250 hours of training and attended two separate weeklong training seminars.

"These dogs have been a part of the community since their first day at the FCSO," Sheriff Rick Staly said. "Now that all three dogs have successfully completed their training, they are ready to serve and protect the community that named them. We can't wait to see what a difference the K-9 Unit will make with these great new additions."

FCSO Employees Donate over \$19,000 to Support 13th Annual Christmas with a Deputy Event - 12/3/19

FCSO Named 2019 Top Ten Best Places to Work in Volusia and Flagler Counties - 12/17/19


The FCSO was one of ten companies selected for the prestigious award. The winners, chosen by a panel of community employment experts, were selected based

on criteria including: unique benefits offered to employees, recognition and appreciation, and the way employers help employees relieve stress and promote fun while on the job.

"When you work at FCSO you become part of our family," Sheriff Rick Staly said. "It is very important to me that the men and women working at FCSO know they are appreciated and that their families can count on us. Our agency has come a long way in just three years. Recognition as one of the best employers is truly an honor and confirmation of the new vision, direction and positive organizational atmosphere we have created since I became Sheriff. We are honored to have won this award and recognition!"

Sheriff's Initiatives Drive Down Crime Rate 36% in Flagler County since 2017 - Crime Reduced 17% in 2019

The Flagler County Sheriff's Office (FCSO) was able to successfully drive down the crime rate in Flagler County again in 2019. Since Sheriff Rick Staly took office in 2017, the crime rate has dropped 36%. Crime in Flagler County dropped 1.2% from 2016 to 2017, 22% from 2017 to 2018, and an additional 17% from 2018 to 2019.



The crime statistics in the primary jurisdiction of the FCSO have again decreased significantly between 2018 and 2019. Total Index Crimes are down 17% from 2018. Violent Crime (Murder, Rape, Robbery, and Aggravated Assault) is down 14.2% and Property Crime (Burglary, Larceny, and Motor Vehicle Theft) is down 20.1%.

"We have implemented many new programs and initiatives since I became Sheriff three years ago and between our team putting these programs into practice, utilizing intelligence led policing, and leveraging the technology available at their fingertips, we are seeing great results," Sheriff Rick Staly said. "We routinely check on probationers – both adult and juvenile; we have dedicated teams with a sole focus on problem areas and problem crimes and tackle them week in and week out. We have an expanded traffic unit that focuses on high-crash roadways and conducts numerous driver safety campaigns throughout the year. Our S.T.R.I.D.E. program in our jail helps get inmates on the right track upon release; and we have the S.W.E.A.T. program that takes potentially troubled youth and shows them the path they are headed down if they don't turn their lives around. We are not a complacent agency. We are an agency with innovative, forward thinkers and proactive enforcement and crime reduction."


