### **Accreditation Team Invites Public Comments about Flagler County Sheriff's Office**

A team of assessors from the Commission for Florida Law Enforcement Accreditation (CFA) will arrive on July 17 to examine all aspects of the Flagler County Sheriff Office policies and procedures, management, operations, and support services. The Flagler County Sheriff's Office has to comply with approximately 260 standards in order to receive Accredited Status. Many of the standards are critical to life, health and safety issues.

As part of the on-site assessment, agency members and the general public are invited to offer comments to the assessment team. Citizens may review standards at <http://www.flaccreditation.org/standards.htm>.

The Accreditation Program Manager for the Flagler County Sheriff's Office is Randall Doyle. "The assessment team is composed of law enforcement practitioners from similar agencies," Doyle said. "The assessors will review written materials; interview sheriff's employees; and visit offices and other places where compliance can be witnessed." The CFA Assessment Team Leader is Ms. Angela Madias of the Davie Police Department. Other team members are Sergeant Thomas Raulen of the Indian River Sheriff's Office and Lieutenant Gary Barrett of the Leesburg Police Department.

Once the Commission's assessors complete their review of the agency, they report back to the full Commission, which will then decide if the agency is to receive Re-accreditation. The Flagler County Sheriff's Office accreditation is for 3 years. "Verification by the accreditation team that the Flagler County Sheriff's Office meets the Commission's standards is part of a voluntary process to maintain accreditation--a highly prized recognition of law enforcement professional excellence," Sheriff Rick Staly said.

Sheriff Staly also serves as an appointed member of the Commission for Florida Law Enforcement Accreditation.
